Dear Chairman Lewis:

We wrote to you in March on behalf of the American Association of Law Libraries (AALL), the American Library Association (ALA), the Association of Research Libraries (ARL), the Special Libraries Association (SLA) and the Medical Library Association (MLA), asking the Committee on Appropriations to support the full FY 2007 appropriations request for the U.S. Government Printing Office (GPO). GPO's request of \$151.5 million included \$43 million for the Salaries and Expenses (S&E) that funds the Federal Depository Library Program (FDLP). Collectively, our associations represent thousands of individuals and institutions serving communities throughout the Nation, including the more than 1200 federal depository libraries located in nearly every congressional district that provide your constituents with access to government information.


In passing the *Legislative Branch Appropriations Act for FY 2007* (H.R. 5521), the House of Representatives approved a total of \$130.5 million for GPO, including \$35.3 million for the S&E. The Senate has now reported its version of H.R. 5521 and approved a total FY 2007 budget for GPO of \$140.3 million, including \$40 million for the S&E. We believe that this higher level of funding is necessary for GPO to maintain its important print distribution program as it continues to invest in many digital initiatives that will benefit depository libraries and the public as we move into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. We urge you to agree to the Senate mark when you meet in conference after the August recess.

We are pleased that both the House and the Senate bills provide the necessary funding for the production of the 2006 print *U.S. Code* and its distribution to depository libraries. The *U.S. Code* is a core document of democracy. In fact, 1036 of the 1243 federal depository libraries receive it in the official, authentic print format so it is easily accessible to your constituents through their local depository library. We thank you and your colleagues for funding the production and distribution of the 2006 print *U.S. Code*. The Senate bill provides the requested S&E funding for mandatory pay and price level increases. It also includes necessary funding to build the technology infrastructure to support the life-cycle of electronic government information. We believe this higher level of funding is absolutely crucial for GPO's Future Digital System (FDsys); for training and user support; for the conversion of cataloging records; for the cataloging of web-harvested documents; and for the authentication of web-harvested and digitized documents.

As always, we are grateful to you and your colleagues on the Committee on Appropriations for your support for GPO and the Federal Depository Library Program. We are confident that you agree with us that Congress must adequately fund GPO as it moves into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century. We respectfully urge you to

agree to the Senate mark for H.R. 5521 and approve \$140.3 million for GPO in FY 2007, including \$40 million for the Federal Depository Library Program, when the conference committee convenes. The investment in systems and services to provide the public with government publications in all formats will ensure that valuable electronic government information created today will be available and preserved for future generations. 
